Astoria Fraternal History Timeline


- 1811 John Jacob Astor sponsored Astoria expedition by land and sea
- 1813 Fort Astoria sold to British Northwest Company and becomes Fort George
- 1818 Joint US/British occupancy of the Oregon Country
- 1825 Hudson's Bay Company buys NW Company and moves post to Vancouver
- 1846 US/Canada border established at 49th Parallel, well north of the Columbia
- 1854 Astoria becomes seat of Clatsop County
- 1854 Astoria Masonic Lodge #7 established
- 1859 Statehood for Oregon
- 1876 City of Astoria incorporated
- 1883 or 1871? Beaver Lodge of Odd Fellows established
- 1886 Finnish Brotherhood established in Astoria
- 1891 Astoria Elks Lodge #180 established
- 1905 Improved Order of Red Men founded
- 1922 Great Fire destroys all fraternal buildings in the downtown area
- 1923-1924 Five purpose-built fraternal buildings re-built in downtown


Ancient Free and Accepted Masons




Ancient of Free and Accepted Masons

- Derived from medieval craft guilds of stone masonry
- 1717 organized in England
- 1733 organized in America
- 1800s largest and most widespread fraternal organization in the world
- WASP elite civic, professional and business leaders
- Secret rituals, signs and costumes provide identity
- Became a model for other fraternal organizations
- Lodge established in Astoria in 1854 oldest in town
























Robert Rennsselaer Bartlett (1876-1950)

- Born and educated in the East
- Arrived in Hood River in 1909 architectural practice
- Engineer and General Manager of the Port of Astoria from 1914 to 1947
- C T Diamond comes to Astoria to work at the Port for Bartlett in 1917
- Built his house at 15th and Lexington (1921)
- Architect of Masonic Temple (1924)
- Designed a scale model of the Columbia (1926)



Benevolent and Protective Order of Elks



- Founded in 1868 in NY as a social club
- "Jolly Corks" avoid city restrictions on drinking
- Elk chosen over Buffalo as American image
- Belief in God, patriotic American, moral values
- Men over 21 years
- Heirarchy similar to Masons and others
- Chartered in Astoria in 1890 Second in Oregon




Elks Building – 453 11th Street (1924)






































Independent Order of Odd Fellows

- Began in England in 1700s helping those in need
- 1819 IOOF founded in Baltimore service mission was to "visit the sick, relieve the distressed, educate the orphan, bury the dead"
- 1851 Rebekahs first in US to welcome women
- 1852 first lodge in Salem
- 1915 largest fraternal organization in US
- Beaver Lodge established in Astoria in 1883?
- Woodmen of the World, Sons of Norway, and others met in the Odd Fellows Hall








Charles Temple Diamond (1876-1967)

- Architect of the Elks Building and the Odd Fellows Hall
- Worked in mining, oil and lumber industries
- Started architectural work Spokane
- Moved to Astoria in 1917 opened a practice
- Designed several buildings after the Great Fire
- Controversy over Uppertown school project
- Moved to Portland in 1926 worked there until 1937
- Post-Depression worked in Eugene, McMinnville and rural Clatsop County
- Died in Newberg in 1967

Improved Order of Redmen

- Originated with secret patriotic groups founded before the American Revolution
- Started as Sons of Liberty Boston Tea Party
- Changed name to Order of Red Men/ Improved
- Used American Indian costumes and names
- Patriotic, fraternal and benevolent
- "Freedom, Friendship and Charity"
- 1874 first organization in Oregon
- Organized in Astoria in <u>????</u>




Red Men Hall – 692 12th Street (1923)





John E Wicks (c1875-1963)



- Architect of the Improved Order of Redmen Hall
- Father of Emma Wicks
 Brown prominent architect
- Designed many prominent public buildings in Astoria














Suomi Hall (1893)

- Finnish Brotherhood formed in 1886
- Hall built in 1893 by the Finnish Temperance Society
- Hall was used by the United Finnish Kaleva Brothers and Sisters
- 1900 Finnish Brotherhood consolidated with other Finnish societies – United Finnish Brotherhood of the World
- 1913 Suomi Hall moved to current location
- 1937 purchased Suomi Hall from the Finnish Temperance Society


Loyal Order of Moose



- Fraternal organization similar to Elks and many others
- Mooseheart in Illinois founded for orphans of members
- Founded in Astoria in ????
- Holmes Motor Company building adapted for Moose by Astoria architect Eino Isaacson in 1950






Loyal Orange Order




- Fraternal organization organized in Northern Ireland
- Establish during a time of Protestant/Catholic conflict
- Defender of Protestantism in Northen Ireland
- Lodges in England, Scotland, Canada and US
- Founded in Astoria in ????

Orange Lodge building leased to Montgomery Wards in 1928 American Legion purchased the building in 1943

Paul Milton Hall-Lewis (c1875-c.1950)

- Architect of the Loyal Orange Lodge
- 1896-1899 Began practice in New York city
- Moved to West Coast in 1900
- Architecture practice in Oregon started in 1904
- Worked in several towns in Oregon, esp Hood River
