Ireland's Great Famine due to the potato crop blight of the 1840s has tremendous historical resonance. Its immediate effect was a mass migration which significantly changed the ethnic composition of the US and Canada. The dire effects of the famine on the Irish people was largely the result of English imperial occupation. Nineteenth century Britain, with its market economy characterized by massive inequality, provided minimal relief to suffering underclasses. The Irish famine and mass migration set a pattern applicable to increasing famine and migration today, caused by a similar market based world system, coupled with the effects of climate change.

The class text is John Percival's "*The Great Famine: Ireland's Potato Famine 1845-51*." It accompanied an A&E series in the nineties.
