## Reviews

### Biographies Class

Who is Ayn Rand? That question was discussed by the ENCORE Biographies Class on Thursday morning, January 27 at the Seaside library. Helen McDaniel, who is coordinator for the class, presented an interesting re-cap of the life of Ayn Rand, beginning with her birth in Russia, and early life there and continuing through her life experiences in the United States, mostly spent in Hollywood and her beloved New York City. Copies of her book, "The Fountainhead," "Atlas Shrugged" and other materials were available for browsing and discussion during the two-hour class.

On February 3, Donna Wright presented an overview of the life of Margaret Sanger, the nurse who was a pioneer in promoting birth control education. After the details of Sanger's life were given, Donna had the class read aloud some of the letters Sanger received during her lifetime. Most were from women pleading for information to help them with gynecological problems, including too many pregnancies and miscarriages. Much discussion was generated by the reading of these letters.

On February 10, John Markham presented information on the life and times of Charles Darwin. The class learned that Darwin had a happy and fairly uneventful childhood followed by training in both medicine and the ministry. Then, however, a remarkable turn of events sent Darwin, at age 22, on the *HMS Beagle* for a five-year voyage of exploration. This voyage made him a scientist, and the rest of the story is science history!

The Biographies class will continue with Bernie Thomas presenting Queen Victoria on February 17, followed by Carol Sigurdson's presentation of Van Gogh's life on February 24. The next classes will feature Sue Zerangue with Cleopatra on March 3, followed by Maureen Sundstrom, February 10, with Sacajawea, and Jean Wingate's discussion of Eleanor Roosevelt's life on March 17.

## On The Road Again

### The story of two snowbirds

Bob and I didn't set out to become snowbirds but we are really "hooked" now! When we first retired in May 2001 (Bob from Rite-Aid Pharmacy and I from Willamette Industries) we took off in our 21-foot Roadtrek Class B motor home for a trip across the northern United States, up into Canada, around the Great Lakes and back into the U.S. Then to Niagara Falls on the Canadian side and back into the U.S., visiting family and friends along the way.

Next we dropped down the eastern seaboard and headed west again – we were "state bagging." Bob had five states to set foot in and I had three states left, until we would have been in all 50 states. We got all but Alaska on this jaunt, and finally got Alaska by cruise ship in September 2009. We stopped in California at Desert Hot Springs, partly because for a number of years Bob had mailed prescriptions to a couple who went there for a few months each year. Their address was "Bubbling Wells Road" and he wanted to see the community that had such an intriguing address. Also, we "chase" hot springs and natural hot water sources.

We stayed one night in an RV park there, and next morning headed to the pool before we checked out. There were eight or ten people in the pool doing water aerobics to a tape of "Wet and Wonderful" with Billie Joel. They invited us to join them and this became the beginning of our "snowbird" life!

The next year we spent a month there and met even more of the wonderful people who inhabit the park. The third year we spent two months, but I had to fly home for our grandson's sixth birthday! The next year I made it the whole two months and have done so each year since. We have many wonderful friends here, although they are now scattered through half-a-dozen different parks. In 2009 we decided to try renting a park model with a little more room than our RV, and I think we'd have a hard time spending two months in the RV now.

There are many activities in the park – Arizona golf, beanbag baseball, washer toss, darts and shuffleboard weekly or every other week, and card games or board games every night. And a group of dedicated golfers.

There is the kazoo band, a chorus and an a capella group, a craft group and a quilting group, as well as a Scripture in the Park group. A small group gets together for a music jam each week (a keyboard player, an omnichord player, a harmonica player, a drummer, a couple of singers and me with my ukulele.) I started learning the uke when we first joined ENCORE!) The main weekly event is the Tuesday Morning Coffee Hour. So many goodies. Bob says it looks more like a wedding reception than just a coffee hour! They recognize the winners of all the week's events and remind us of the next week's happenings.

This area is very rich in wonderful entertainment, too. The Palm Springs International Film Festival is usually in progress when we arrive. There are several venues for live theater in nearby cities and there are interesting tours to take. We have been trying to get on a windmill tour (never a shortage of things to do). As you can see, it may be hard to find time to just relax, but as confirmed snowbirds, we manage that too!

This was my first experience at a major film festival and it was so much more than I anticipated.



Last December I flew into Las Vegas and met my friends so I could tag along with them on the ride to Palm Springs. We were headed for the Palm Springs International Film Festival. We caravanned with three cars, stopping at every outdoor outlet mall along the way, definitely not my thing to do but the gals loved it. We arrived on a cool/cold windy day and it didn't change much for the week we were there. I did not dress warm enough.

On December 27, the box office opened for reservations. This is a lesson in futility for a first-timer. Rodger had ordered a "six-pack" for me, which consists of six movies, not necessarily the choices I would have made. One could order three movies a day for a 21-pack. Those who pay from \$100 to \$2,000 are Preferred Donors and they get first choice. Perhaps I should tell just how one chooses the movies to see. Once you order the package, they send you a 50-page Entertainment Movie Guide. Three of us gals took hours deciphering what looked to be the most interesting. No easy task.

There are only so many seats in a theater. So one has to stand in line for about an hour before each movie.

About 20 minutes before the show starts they take in about 50 people at a time, until all the seats are filled. If one gets to the line too late, well . . . you know the rest.

The first movie was "The Womb." It was my favorite of the six I saw. I do believe that ENCORE could do a class

on this movie alone. I was so taken with this story, and so completely involved in every nuance, that it became more than a movie to me. There was hardly any dialogue, and that's when you realize the professionalism of talented directors. A look, or a sigh, said more than any word could have conveyed. Then the movie ended and I had to pull myself together to find out what others thought. Could I have been the only one so affected by this film?

So where does one go to get the "Siskel & Ebert" of our day? Of course, I headed straight to the ladies' room. You can only imagine the line to get in, but that was all right, because it gave me the opportunity to hear everyone's opinions, and ladies waiting to get into such places have opinions on everything.

There must have been 20 different interpretations of what we just saw. It didn't confuse me, but it did show me what critics go through in critiquing movies, which is quite apropos for this time of the year, what with the Academy Awards, etc.

Why do they have these festivals? Not just for our entertainment, to be sure. Remember, this was my first experience, so I didn't realize that these festivals are measured by the votes taken for each picture. So . . . when you are reading your newspaper's entertainment section and you see so many stars per movie, these festivals are where it's determined. When you walk into the theater you are given a ballot, and you will be chastised by the ushers if you don't fill it out. They require everyone to vote, and comment if one wishes. I imagine it is the same for the Sundance Festival, which I am now longing to attend.

As I write this, I wonder if our members would be interested in a class in which we view an important, time-worthy film and follow it up with discussion. A movie such as "The King's Speech," "Black Swan," "Inception," "Memento," etc. could give us hours of discussion, and most are available at the video store. Just a thought.

### She found Astoria while on a cruise

Like so many of us who are not native to Astoria or Clatsop County, it was love at first sight. Meg Weaver was born and raised in Stockholm, Sweden. She came to the United States in 1966, a few days before her 21<sup>st</sup> birthday and lived first in southern California, then in northern California by Monterey Bay. Then, after a year in Carson City, Nevada, Meg discovered Astoria while on a 14-day cruise down the Columbia River. She studied *The Daily Astorian* online, visited Astoria again in February 2006, still liked what she saw, and moved here in May.

Meg has a BS in electronic engineering. After a few years working as an electronics engineer, she was recruited by Hewlett-Packard and worked as a sales engineer for the company's test and measurement group, selling to engineers. She had one really fun assignment, driving a 40-foot-long 12.5-foot-wide, three-axle "mobile laboratory" full of test equipment, around the western sales region. She traveled as far east as Colorado, south to New Mexico and even to El Paso, Texas. Later, she moved into marketing, loved it, and has stayed there ever since.

Meg runs her own publishing company on the Internet. It's named Wooden Horse Publishing, after a little wooden horse that family legend says was her first toy. The company provides educational material to help small business owners. This includes every area of a business, but especially marketing and computer technology. The company's products include books, how-to guides, special reports, blogs, Twitter, webinars (a seminar on the web) and an online media directory.

Having time or not, Meg loves to read. She's a self-proclaimed news junkie; she's always on the Internet, checking the latest events, and CNN is almost

always on in her home office. One of the many reasons, she says, for keeping up with the news, is that you learn about so many different subjects. She gravitates towards scientific topics but is not exclusive. Her reading is typically focused on non-fiction. The novelist Stephen King has said that reading fiction was ruined for him when he learned the techniques of writing it. Meg says it is the same for her. "I have to stop ever so often when reading a work of fiction, because I want to analyze why it was so good – or what I would do to fix a very bad section."

If she had more time, Meg would travel more, teach classes for ENCORE, pick up on her old hobby of horseback riding, audition for one of the community theater groups, "finish that book I was writing," and read more. Food should be included as well, "as I love to eat good food."

It's evident that Meg is a person of accomplishment, and that includes her recent weight loss of 90 pounds. Asked how she did this, Meg replied that "I wish I had a miracle cure, but I just practiced the usual formula – eat less, exercise more." The secret, she says, is portion control. "Our concept of what is a portion has become totally distorted. Last fall I was looking for a set of cereal bowls, so I could eat my oatmeal like a civilized person (not out of the Glad-Ware it was frozen and microwaved in)." Meg says she couldn't find an American-made "cereal bowl" that held fewer than 28 ounces. "Even if it's healthy oatmeal, that's too much!" She says that she can eat chocolate cake, or ice cream, or . . . as long as she eats just a small piece, or a small serving. Thus she doesn't feel like she's on a diet she can't wait to get "off." Rather, it's simply her new way of eating. It was a two-year effort, and Meg says she wants to lose 30 more pounds.

A few years ago Meg saw a notice in the paper about the science exchange class, was instantly interested, joined ENCORE, and has taken several science classes since. She is currently serving ENCORE as secretary, taking minutes at board meetings. "I feel very strongly that we should all continue to learn at

any state in life, and I would like to see us making growing our membership a priority."
