

Viewing the San Andreas Fault

In recent years, the specter of a devastating earthquake along the Cascadia subduction zone seems to have become our constant companion. However, by no means is our area the only geological danger zone. California's San Andreas Fault (SAF) is equally notorious. Moreover, its spasms are of far more recent occurrence than the last quake produced by Cascadia nearly 500 years ago. Elfi and I recently had the opportunity to view the southernmost parts of the San Andreas. We traveled the fault for about 100 miles from an area referred to as Whitewater Preserve southeast to the Salton Sea. For the last few miles the road to the Whitewater parallels the SAF just a few feet west of the actual fault line. The color and makeup of the rocks and rubble are clearly different on its two sides. Riding in a bus, one can hardly shake the idea of (cont'd on page 4)

(cont'd from page 3) how far down the vehicle would tumble if the ground were suddenly to open up in a major earthquake. We were lucky to see ten desert bighorn sheep no more than 100 feet away but on the other side of the crease and they seemed unconcerned. The verdant Whitewater Preserve is privately owned and makes good use of plentiful water that wells forth from the fault. They use it for a series of trout ponds.

The area I'm describing is the northwestern extension of the Sonoran Desert. The average day-time temperatures eight months of the year in the Coachella Valley are well over 100 degrees Fahrenheit. The surface here is barren, except for an intermittent strip of green that identifies the SAF. This green is particularly evident close to the city of Thousand Palms (near where Bob and Aletha Westerberg make their winter home). After leaving The Westerberg's lunch table, we went to one of the old oases-- Coachella Valley Preserve. The palms and other trees here are wild, i. e., were not planted and irrigated by man. The oasis is fed by water that rises through the San Andreas Fault and actually runs on the surface. There is even a good-size pond here. Since the fronds are not clipped, they form a kind of skirt that reaches from the live fronds to the ground. This creates beautiful habitat for birds, rodents, and other small mammals as well as insects. We did not see many animals: one lizard, one coot, one mallard, several small song birds. Most local mammals are nocturnal.

From the Preserve we drove to the eastern end of the SAF, where its end is covered by the Salton Sea. This body of water is California's biggest lake, roughly 35 miles by 15 miles in size and has no outflow. Even more interesting are the facts that the surface of the lake is 226 feet below sea level and the lake was created by accident in 1905. California's attempt to divert irrigation waters from the Colorado River in 1903 set the stage. Heavy snowmelt and rain caused the newly dug canals to be overpowered and the lake was formed. Since then, evaporation has increased its salinity to the point that in a few more years the only fish to be found there are the salt-tolerant tilapia.

So much for the surface. What are the hydrological implications? Salt water seeps down the fault line. Fortunately, impervious rock isolates the Coachella Aquifer. Without its sustaining fresh water, the valley from Indio to Palm Springs would not have palms, citrus trees, and year-round vegetable production. For, if all things green are not irrigated there year-round, they will turn brown, as brown as the entire San Andreas Fault where its waters don't reach the surface of the earth, and as naked as the 6000 wind turbines at the west end of the Coachella Valley.

ENCORE LUNCHES

Fultano's Pizza was the place, and the theme of the **December 4 luncheon** was Christmas ornaments. As researched by Aletha Westerberg, according to the historical records in the <u>History of Christmas Tree Ornaments</u>, the custom of decorating Christmas trees emerged in the early 16th century in Germany. Martin Luther decorated the first Christmas tree with candles to entertain the children. During this time Christmas trees were embellished with wafers, candies, fruits, paper flowers, hard cookies baked in various shapes and tinsels made from tin and silver.

Christmas trees along with the fanciful ornaments entered England in 1840 through the hands of Queen Victoria and her German-born husband, Prince Albert. Glass ornaments, decorative beads, paper baskets with sugared almonds and hot air balloons were used for decoration. (cont'd to page 5)

Christmas tree ornaments reached America around 1880. In 1973 the American Hallmark Company first launched the Keepsake Christmas Ornaments that revolutionized the decorations. Once a collection of decorated glass balls and yarn figures, keepsake ornaments are now found in a wide variety of wood, acrylic, bone china, porcelain and hand-made forms.

Several ENCORE members had brought special ornaments or ornamentation with them. Lynne Ryan brought white crocheted ornaments made by her grandmother. Bob and Aletha Westerberg brought metal, handmade ornaments, Helen Pitkanen brought a Finnish flag, and Mary Ann Ylipelto brought two hats, the most popular of which was a cap topped with a bell that moved back and forth and played a Christmas song. She won first prize.

According to the Constitution, the President and Vice-President must be sworn in on January 20, which this year fell on a Sunday. Inauguration ceremonies were to be held January 21, also Martin Luther King's birthday.

In 2008 President Barack Obama attended St. John's Episcopal Church, the same church as Franklin D. Roosevelt attended in 1933. However, in 2013 he plans to attend a service at the National Cathedral and will be sworn into office at a private service. The Vice President takes his oath of office before the president. Part of the reason for having the vice president sworn in first is that it protects the line of succession to the presidency (according to *Presidential Inauguration Facts* by Martin Kelly, About.com Guide, as looked up by Aletha Westerberg).
