Art Studio Tours-Thanks Reta!

The Curriculum Committee and Reta Lindstrom as coordinator, really out-did itself when they put together the Studio Tour Class! It was one of the most interesting classes I've been involved in and I do not have even one artistic bone in my body.....

We first visited "Dots and Doodles" on 10th Street and found out many interesting things about many of the artist supplies that are available; we were treated with coffee and treats, too. Then we went a couple of doors south to Julia Carter's Arts and Cultural Exchange for a fascinating talk about their programs and workshops and an art exhibit by a local artist.

The next week we visited the Light Box Photographic Studio where this young couple have a gallery and show local artists' photographic works and also do photo restoration and have quite a collection of cameras on display. They even rent cameras and have film available. Delightful, to say the least.

Then there was the visit to the Astoria Fiber Arts Gallery – Astoria has such unique artists and equipment. This visit showed us techniques of using and possibilities from working with looms and spinning wheels.

We visited well-known artist Terri Remington at her studio on Irving Avenue. Not only did she have a wonderful view of the river, her artwork was simply outstanding. She makes masks – and has done a lovely one of her beloved dog; she does

stained glass and also does a very unusual art form where trees resembling the human body are formed from clay and have limbs and roots also of clay – all 3-D and formed on circles of canvas covering round boards. She integrates driftwood and shells and other natural things into her art, also.

The class visited Charles Schweigert's studio on Klaskanine Avenue. Unfortunately, I was unable to go that day so I just know that he does mixed media painting and I am sure it was interesting, as well.

The last meeting of the class

took us across the river to Chinook to a couple of glass studios, each unique in its own way. The first was M & D Designs. They teach classes in several art mediums, including beading, making glass flowers, and silver and precious stones which were being demonstrated for us that day. The other gallery was "Inspirations" and the owner, Debbie Patana, showed us how easy it is to cut glass – a couple of our members actually did that. And she explained the process she uses. She makes some very interesting and beautiful things, including kaleidoscopes!




